The Accelerated Collaborative Teacher Residency (ACT-R) Program May be for YOU!

Stipends of up to \$35,000 are available for ACT-R candidates in Mild/Moderate Disabilities, Moderate/Severe Disabilities, Deaf and Hard of Hearing or Early Childhood Special Education. Funding is available for a fifth and final cohort of candidates entering in Fall 2014.

ACT-R candidates obtain a credential in one year through full-time study as a teacher in residence. In the second year, graduates are employed in LAUSD and complete their Master's Degree and Clear Credential while on-the-job.

- ✓ Committed to serving students with disabilities in high need schools
- ✓ Available for full-time study (fieldwork during the day and late afternoon/evening classes)

- ✓ Meets admission requirements for CSUN credential and master's degree programs
- ✓ Has not previously served as a teacher of record

- Receive initial and ongoing support from university faculty and district personnel
