

Understanding Freedom Of Speech In California - The First Amendment protects your right to express your opinion, even if it's unpopular. You may criticize the President, Congress, or the chief of police without fear of retaliation. But this right doesn't extend to libel, slander, obscenities, "true threats", or speech that incites imminent violence or law-breaking.
