 CSUN is not going to have the same connection with first time freshman and transfer students – we need this tool to help us connect with ALL students.

 CSUN is concerned that equity gaps will grow in the virtual environment if we can't effectively connect with students and help them connect with each other.

20-21 Assessment Survey Methodology

Sense of belonging instruments (1-5, where 5 = strongly agree)

- I feel comfortable at my school.
- I feel like I am an important member of my school's community.
- I feel supported at my school.

Self-efficacy instruments (1-5, where 5 = strongly agree)

- I am confident that I will achieve the goals that I set for myself.
- I can learn what is being taught in class this year.
- Once I've decided to accomplish something that's important to me, I keep trying to accomplish it, even if it is harder than I thought.

Timeline

- Initial survey: concurrent with match (September)
- Mid survey: end of first academic term (December)
- Final survey: end of second academic term (April)



20-21 Assessment Survey Results

Sense of Belonging	4.24	4.37	4.48	+5.65%	
Self-Efficacy	4.61	4.4	4.59	No change	

Trends

- The mentee population showed **consistent increases in sense-of-belonging and self-efficacy** throughout the year.
- Although mentor self-efficacy decreased between the start of fall and spring semesters, it rebounded by the end of the academic year.

Key Result: Mentors need focused support throughout the academic year that builds their ability to accomplish goals and use the resources they have to succeed.





CSUN Mentoring Community

- Improve training- educational equity
- Add CSUN customized Discussion Guides
- Use the platform to communicate follow up services
- Customize the "mentor notes" section of the platform
- Hire full time "Super Mentors" to help with flags and targeted interventions
- Continue to build Care Team (EAB)

Final Thoughts from 20-21 Mentees




"Actually engage with your mentor. It might feel awkward at first, but it's nice to have someone to talk to that has no real expectations for you and genuinely wants to help. Also, it helps to actually have a goal or something you want to improve on so they can work on it with you and help you achieve it." - Alyssa Rhoades

"A challenge I faced coming to CSUN is the unfamiliar university system, but my mentor has helped me to understand the difference - like when he explained the difference between a counselor and advisor. I was very confused to why I couldn't talk to a counselor about classes. Another challenge is knowing what classes to take and my mentor gave me the links to contact an advisor. I had questions and didn't know who to ask but having a mentor has helped me adjust little by little to the transfer process." - Jenessa Serdenia







- Early Start is either "Strongly Encouraged/Recommended" or "Required"
 - Required must participate in Early Start (Applies to Every CSU)
- **CSUN Early Start Goal:** Prepare students academically and personally in the summer before the start of the freshman year.
- Benefits of Early Start at CSUN:
 Math: passing the proctored final assessment could help improve your math placement in the Fall.
 - STEM majors can save up to 11 units long term!

Writing: Complete your stretch writing sequence by the end of your first semester at CSUN instead of taking a whole academic year!


