SWRK 635 Research Methods II

- 1. Complete a research (graduate project) proposal
 - a. Develop a research question/hypothesis
 - b. Complete an introduction, literature review, proposed methodology
 - c. Revisit research ethics & abuse of research participants
 - d. Obtain approval from CSUN Institutional Review Board (IRB)
- 2. Learn program evaluation skills to evaluate social work practice
- 3. Types of graduate projects
 - a. Traditional: Collect data or use secondary data.
 - b. Alternative: Grant proposal, policy analysis, program evaluation, systematic literature review, or documentary.



SWRK 698 Graduate Project

- 1. Students will be introduced to the Electronic Thesis/Dissertation (ETD) system via Graduate Studies.
- 2. Student to collect, analyze and report direct observations; and write a research paper that includes an introduction, method, results, and discussion chapters.
- 3. The paper must meet Graduate Studies' requirements and APA publication guidelines including formatting.
- 4. Students will also present a poster in an open community-invited forum. The Graduate Project may include an alternative research project such as a documentary, program evaluation, policy analysis, or grant.
